
<u>Helen Maurice-Jones – Board Chairperson</u> - I have a bachelor degree in Business Management from Manchester Metropolitan University and 20 years' professional experience in Project Delivery, Process Improvement and Risk environments. I have worked in a range of industries including, Banking, Mining, Imports and Pharmaceutics. <u>Michael Black – Principal</u> - My career in education began back in 1985 when I accepted a teaching post to the small mining town of Kambalda West. For the next twenty years, I taught in a number schools both country and metropolitan, as well as some time teaching in England and Japan. In the late '90s I was posted to North Beach PS and spent the next twenty years as a teacher, then Deputy Principal and eventually A/Principal. In 2017, I was appointed Principal of Mullaloo Beach Primary School and now I am very happy to have been appointed to Carine Primary School.

My philosophy has always been that the building of strong, positive and respectful relationships is the cornerstone of all good schools. I am also passionate in my belief that every child can be a successful learner and we must work to develop our students academically, creatively, physically and emotionally in partnership with our community.



<u>Paul Rigby</u> - I was a career research scientist at The University of Western Australia and have spent most of my life collecting and synthesising information, trying to better understand how "stuff" in this world is constructed, organised and controlled. I have a biomedical science degree and a PhD in Pathology (Cell Biology) and spent more than 20 years working as a senior team leader in the Pharmacology department examining potential causes of asthma.

I was recently, until retirement, an Associate Professor in the Centre for Microscopy, Characterisation and Analysis at UWA, which is a core research infrastructure facility supporting all researchers in Western Australia who wish to use the high-tech instruments that we manage and operate. I was the Optical Microscopy Specialist within CMCA and have more than 80 refereed research publications, where I worked with anyone wishing to use microscopes for their research. This work was both challenging and stimulating and spanned broad areas of research in biomedicine, plant and marine biology, chemistry, physics, geology and engineering. I firmly believe that exposing our young people to the wonders of science and then challenging them to observe and question what they see is essential if we are to engage them in the science and life of the future.



<u>Pippa Couper</u> - I am a Clinical Psychologist with many years' experience in delivering mental health and child development services. I run a private psychology clinic with a focus on depression, anxiety and trauma and in the past I have held a variety of positions within the Child and Adolescent Health Service (Dept of Health). This included coordinating a program for children with mental health difficulties who had disengaged from schooling and providing consultation to education staff. I have experience in delivering programs focused on developing children's self-confidence, engagement in learning, emotional resiliency, social competency, mindfulness skills and emotional processing.

I also have experience in building positive, strong ties between students, staff, parents and community in school environments. From my work I have developed knowledge in mental health, community resources, and specific school-based emotional wellbeing resources that could assist the School Board when considering ways of enriching students' social and emotional wellbeing.
